

Klein Collection of the History of Vincennes, Indiana, Finding Aid II: Index to "150th Anniversary of the Indiana Gazette"

This finding aid provides access to a portion of the Klein Collection which is a scrapbook containing photocopies of the publication titled "150th Anniversary of the *Indiana Gazette*," Special Edition of the *Vincennes Sun-Commercial*, Aug. 1, 1954, written and compiled by Addie McElfresh. This acts as a chronological listing of many important events concerning the history of Vincennes, Indiana.

The Klein Collection is a set of about 50 three-ring binders containing information from various sources such as historical books and documents, newspaper articles, pamphlets, booklets, personal notes and papers of George Klein (1921-2004). Klein was a Vincennes, Indiana, resident, former Knox County Clerk, and life member of the Vincennes Historical Society.

The Klein Collection is numbered from 100 to 7500; a paper slip index to the collection is available in Lewis Historical Library. See the Klein Collection Find Aid I for an index to the collection.
